Research into practice: Improving responses to child sexual abuse of racially minoritised children

Presenters: Kairika Karsna, Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse; Shauna Breen, Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse; and Noshin Mohamed, SWAS

The Centre of expertise on child sexual abuse (CSA Centre) will share findings from its [knowledge review on child sexual abuse of African, Asian and Caribbean heritage children](#), along with the work that has followed this review to improve responses to child sexual abuse of racially minoritised children in England and Wales. This includes developing a practice leads programme on child sexual abuse for 'by and for' organisations, and creating [React network](#) that brings together African, Asian and Caribbean heritage practitioners and researchers to share and develop knowledge and practice on responding to child sexual abuse. Shauna and Kairika will be joined by one of the Practice Leads and a React participant, Noshin Mohamed from SWAS, a space for South Asian Social Workers and Allied Professionals.

Hidden harm: Revealing teenage relationship abuse through data, research, and practice

Presenters: Dr Ruth Weir, City St George's University of London; and Deputy Chief Constable Katy Barrow-Grint, Gloucestershire Constabulary

Adolescence is a pivotal moment in the trajectory of violence, yet teenage relationship abuse remains largely invisible within current systems. Drawing on a unique collaboration between policing and academia, alongside a [national multi-agency working group](#), this presentation explores how new and emerging research is uncovering hidden harm, strengthening data and evidence, and informing more effective responses across systems.



Delivering local teenage abuse relationship training

Presenters: Meena Kumari, HOPE Training; and Savita Vaid, Go Getta CIC

H.O.P.E Training & Leadership C.I.C. is a Leicester-based specialist VAWG organisation and Go-Getta C.I.C. is a leading Youth Work provider in Leicestershire, actively engaging with and supporting some of the region's most vulnerable and 'at risk' young people. Together, they delivered the TRA project across LLR, working with three key audiences — professionals, parents and carers, and young people. Their session shares the project journey and findings, exploring how tailored training across these groups strengthens community response to teenage relationship abuse.

Take a breath: Non-fatal strangulation (NFS)

Marianne K Brown has dedicated over a decade to developing and delivering participatory music projects in women's refuges, work that forms the foundation of her ongoing PhD research at City St George's, University of London. Combining professional performance with scholarly inquiry, she investigates how music facilitates transformation, healing, and empowerment for survivors of domestic violence. A professional cellist trained at the Royal Academy of Music, Royal Northern College of Music, and Liszt Academy Budapest, Marianne has performed with leading orchestras including the Hallé, Welsh National Opera, and English National Ballet alongside solo and ensemble recitals. She holds an MA in Cultural Management (City) and an MSc in Psychosocial Studies (Birkbeck), teaches cello, and is a trained psychodynamic counsellor, bringing interdisciplinary expertise to her understanding of music's role in wellbeing and social change. She is currently Musician in Residence at a London Cancer hospital and has presented her research at conferences internationally.
